WHAT IS IRISH AID?

Irish Aid is Ireland's official programme of overseas assistance to developing countries. It is managed by the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade. Irish Aid works with governments and development organisations in over 80 countries. In humanitarian emergencies Irish Aid saves lives by quickly providing vital funds and assistance to organisations on the ground. Most of Irish Aid's work, however, is focused on long-term development, especially in nine key partner countries, where it works with governments and other agencies to tackle the root causes of hunger, poverty and inequality and support human rights. Ireland is one of the most generous aid donors in the world, and the Irish Aid programme is seen as a model in terms of its effectiveness.

WHAT ARE THE MILLENNIUM DEVELOPMENT GOALS?

Irish Aid is working to achieve the United Nations Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). In the year 2000, leaders of 189 nations, including Ireland, signed up to achieving a set of eight goals to eliminate world poverty and improve the quality of life for all by the end of 2015. The MDGs include promoting environmental sustainability, gender equality and achieving universal primary education.

As the deadline draws close, although significant progress has been made towards achieving the MDGs, poverty and hunger are still a reality in our world, and much more remains to be done beyond the timeframe of the MDGs. For this reason governments around the world are currently working together to come up with a new set of sustainable development goals.

THE AIM OF IRISH AID'S OUR WORLD AWARDS

Irish Aid established the Our World Awards in 2005 to increase pupils' understanding of the MDGs and the work of Irish Aid, and to help them to explore the links between their lives and the lives of children in developing countries.

THE THEME FOR THE 2015 OUR WORLD IRISH AID AWARDS CARING FOR OUR WORLD'

This year's theme is linked to all of the eight MDGs, but has particular relevance to MDG 7: ensure environmental sustainability. In the last decade, developing and developed countries have worked together to fight hunger, promote gender equality, achieve universal primary education, improve health and ensure environmental sustainability. Ireland, through Irish Aid, has contributed significantly to this effort. Substantial progress has been made in relation to

some of the MDGs, for example: The number of people living in extreme poverty (surviving

- on less than \$1.25 every day) has fallen by 1.09 billion
- the number of undernourished people has fallen by 209
- the primary school enrolment rate is now at 90% in million since 1990
- international cooperation has almost totally eliminated developing regions
- ozone-depleting substances, and the proportion of terrestrial and coastal marine areas under protection has

While progress has been made, significant work remains to be done.

In our world of over 7 billion people: just over 1 billion are still living in extreme poverty, with

- many of these in sub-Saharan Africa and in some parts
- 58 million children are still out of school, with those living in conflict affected areas particularly at risk, and the quality of schooling offered in many countries is very poor global emissions of carbon dioxide continue to rise, marine
- stocks continue to be overexploited, forests are disappearing at an unsustainable rate, renewable water sources are becoming scarcer and animal diversity is on the decline. (see: http://www.un.org/millenniumgoals/2014%20MDG%20 report/MDG%202014%20English%20web.pdf).

The Awards website (www.ourworldirishaidawards.ie) has a range of classroom materials relevant for this year's Awards theme including:

These materials will help you and your pupils to think and talk about development issues and explore this year's theme. All the materials provided on the website are designed to support curriculum areas/areas of learning, and Literacy and Numeracy strategies are integrated throughout the lesson plans.

Fill out the Our World Awards Entry Form (included with this booklet) with your group/class. Use the 'Entry Diary' section to record the activities you do with your pupils as they explore global development issues and progress with their project. The 'Entry Diary' is used as part of the judging process so it is very important that you record all the work done by you and your pupils.

CHOOSE A TOPIC! 2

This year's theme 'Caring for Our World' is linked to all of the eight MDGs, but has particular relevance to MDG 7: Ensure environmental sustainability. Choose the topic under this theme which most interests your pupils. Projects could focus, for example, on any or all of the following:

- the importance of the eight MDGs as a way to improve the lives of children in developing countries (for a list of countries officially classified as developing visit www.ourworldirishaidawards.ie)
- the experiences of children in a particular developing country or countries
- the importance of taking care of the environment (MDG 7) as a way of fighting hunger, poverty and inequality in developing countries

Whatever the chosen topic, it is important to ensure that the project addresses the theme 'Caring for Our World', with a focus on the developing world context.



Create a project that demonstrates your group/ class response to this year's theme. The list of possible projects is endless, and you will find plenty of ideas on the Our World Awards website (www.ourworldirishaidawards.ie). You can use any medium to present your pupils understanding of the theme. If the pupils take photos, make a film or create materials, send them in, along with their entry.

Once your group/class completes their project work, it is time for the pupils to communicate what they have learned to the rest of the school and/or the wider community. Pupils could, for example: talk to the other classes in the school about what they learned — put up posters or information in the school or local community — host an assembly or exhibition of their work — compile and show a slide presentation — tell people about what they can do to help eradicate poverty in the world, e.g. buy fairtrade products — write to public representatives — send a letter or email to the local paper or community newsletter record a radio show — write a blog about your progress
